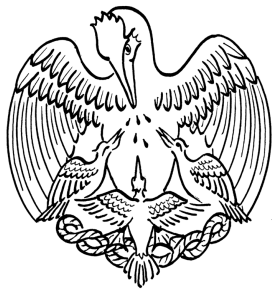

Dear Parent

The inexorable rhythm of school life drives us forward to the summer break. We are now in the usual teacher panic mode as we try to fit six weeks' activity into two. We know we will do it; we just don't quite believe that we will: 'twas ever thus!

Year 11 pupils leave ...

And what a leaving it was. Resplendent in their ball gowns and dinner suits, they graced Fountain Court for the last time on the evening of the Leavers' Ball. They each had their moment of celebrity as they arrived on Fountain Court in limousines, in a horse-drawn carriage (an elegant option), motorbikes, mini-motorbikes – which quite stole the show – and in some extremely smart cars. (I can only comment on the colours, being completely oblivious to

makes and models; it's what you would expect from the proud owner of a 12-year-old Ford Fiesta, I imagine.)

Encouragingly, there were many more young people who arrived on foot this year – a very sensible and cheap choice. We were also very impressed by the enterprising parent who stopped a limousine on its way into the College site and booked it for her son and his friends when the driver had delivered his original passengers onto Fountain Court. They were able to travel in style into the College from the entrance for only a few pounds; no one knew they had only boarded 10 metres from the drop-off point.

We were very sad to see this year group go – their contribution to the College has been huge in so many ways. Their leave-taking was

exemplary, both on the annual leavers' day and at the Ball. Their relationships with our staff have been terrific as evidenced by the many thoughtful gifts they showered on their teachers and their Head of Year, Mrs Anderson. They take our very best wishes with them. I hope when next we see them on results day in August that they have gained the results they need to take their next steps in education and training.

... and Year 7 begins

Last week saw our focus shift to our new pupils. They joined us for their Induction Day and then again for the Year 6 Parents' Evening. If first impressions are anything to go by, then we can look forward to a wonderful new cohort of pupils joining our school community in September.

For us, the joy of such occasions is seeing the change in the Year 6 pupils by the end of the day: they are so nervous when they arrive and so much more relaxed when they leave, helped always by a fiercely contested game of rounders on the school field.

Our Year 9 pupils, who next year will 'buddy' Year 7 forms and assist their form tutors during morning registration in a wide range of ways, deserve special mention. They did so much to make the Year 6 pupils feel welcome and to reassure them that it would be easy for them to join our community in September. We were all very proud of them.

Looking forward

We are working hard at the moment on our bid to run the new school in Trumpington. We believe that formalising our existing relationship with Trumpington is to the benefit of our joint communities. It offers so many new opportunities for our own pupils to benefit from our bringing a new school into partnership with SVC; for example, being involved in the design of the new school would offer us the opportunity to include complementary facilities to our own and allow us to expand our curriculum choices significantly; forming a shared business infrastructure and leadership structure across the two schools leads to significant economies of scale, releasing more funds to deploy on the education of our young people.

A changing system

As parents of pupils in Years 8 and 9 will already be aware, we have been phasing in a new model of pastoral management at the College over the past two years, following a restructuring of college staffing. To this point, we have been very ably served by our Heads of Year, teaching staff who have had 4 hours' extra time each week to provide pastoral care for their year groups. They have done an excellent job, but their time to do it has been seriously limited by their teaching commitments.

We decided in 2006 that we needed to design a model that allowed for immediate response to issues and concerns whether from pupils or parents; we then appointed two Year Managers who have a full 37-hour week to manage their year groups. Whilst they also have other wide-ranging responsibilities to discharge, they are able to respond when issues arise.

In September, two new Year Managers will join us: as Year 7 Manager, we have Miss Levison, who met her new charges on Induction Day and their parents the evening after and Mrs Maltby, who will be the Year Manager of Year 8. Miss Plant will remain as Head of Year 11.

I should like to register my warmest thanks to Mrs Anderson, formerly Head of Year 11, and Mrs Horrocks who will step down from her rôle as Head of Year 7 at the end of this term. They have both worked very hard and done an exemplary job with their respective year groups.

Congratulations to ...

... Tom Curran. The Guardian newspaper's photographer joined us last week to capture the success of Tom Curran, Year 11, who won the competition run by the Guardian in association with the BBC to become 'Young Composer of the Year'. This is a stunning achievement, given the prestige of the competition and the number and quality of the entries. Tom's piece will be played at the Proms; he has also been commissioned to compose another piece for next year's Proms. He has been a wonderful pupil. His contribution to the Arts has been prodigious by anyone's standards: he won a place on the National Youth Theatre's technical course this summer; he has run the school's stage sound and lighting provision for the past three years and has trained his successors; he was one of the first of our pupils to achieve the Arts

Award; he was leading man in 'High School Musical' performed by Sawston Youth Drama last term and is a pianist of the highest calibre. That he has a wonderful future ahead of him is not in doubt; we have been privileged to have him as a student.

Athletics achievements

Over a hundred pupils have been attending athletics club each Monday evening this term and competing in inter school competitions on a Wednesday night with much success.

The annual Jubilee Cup competition (District championships) was held at the University Track at Wilberforce Road on 2 July; we fielded boys' and girls' teams in all age groups. We were delighted with our pupils' achievements, many notching up their 'personal best'. Overall, the Sawston team was placed in a very respectable third position.

Following County trials, four of our top athletes were selected to represent Cambridgeshire in the Anglian Championships this year: Ben Kelk (Year 10 Hurdles, High Jump and Relay), Martin Lawrence (Year 10 Shot putt and Discus), Hayley Sayer (Year 10 Hammer) and Rachel Davidson (Year 8 High Jump). Following this competition, Ben and Hayley achieved National standards and qualified for the English Schools' Championships in Gateshead. Martin was only a few centimetres off the qualifying standard and, unfortunately,

just missed out on selection. We are all very proud of their achievements and look forward to seeing them compete at the 2012 Olympics! I hope they will remember who their friends were when it comes to handing out tickets ...

Many of you will know that we have been keeping school athletics records for many years and for the first time in living memory we have two generations featuring. Ben Kelk achieved both the Year 10 High Jump record and the 100m this season whilst his mother, Sarah Kelk (nee Lintott), still holds a sprint record. Additionally Tom, Ben's older brother features on our records as well. Clearly athletic talent is inherited! Never mind, Mr Kelk; the lads probably get their musical talent from you ...

Hayley and Ben take our very best wishes with them this weekend for the ultimate success of gaining a national ranking. Please check our website at www.sawstonvc.org for an update next Monday.

24 Year 10 pupils have been working towards their Junior Sports Leaders' Award throughout this year. They have undertaken training in leading and coaching younger children under the guidance of Mr Davies. This term the group have excelled in the support they have offered to our primary aged children as they very ably organised a series of sports festivals and a Key stage 3 triathlon competition; they have received many compliments from our primary colleagues. Additionally all leaders have given up their Friday lunchtimes to organise an inter-forum rounders competition for our Year 7 pupils. The Arts

Music

Our Lower School Concert on 24 June attracted its usual capacity audience, all of whom left delighted by the variety of the programme and the talent and composure of your young people as they very ably performed their pieces, taking pleasure in their own and other's performances.

Some of our dramatic pupils are currently treading the boards at the Corn Exchange in the production of 'Oliver'. Ben Chamberlain has landed the prestigious rôle of the Artful Dodger; Bethany Bailey, Rebecca Bartram and Emma O'Brien are in the chorus. They have our congratulations and very best wishes for a successful run.

From all of these wonderful opportunities provided for our

young people by our hard-working staff, we receive terrific reports of their terrific behaviour and enthusiasm for the Arts. We are very lucky to have colleagues who put so much time and effort into organising such worthwhile experiences for our pupils. They have my grateful thanks.

Pupil Forum/Head Boy and Head Girl

We have been hugely impressed by the pupils' interest and engagement in the new Pupil Forum. 105 pupils have volunteered to take part and will now help to develop the college in three key areas: learning, environment and ethos. Each Forum will be led by pupils and will focus on individual projects that will further the college as a place to excel, a place to enjoy and achieve, and a place in which to feel safe and valued. To oversee the Pupil Forum and to represent the college we invited applications for Head Boy and Head Girl from our Y11 Forum members. We were delighted by the quality of application from the nineteen candidates; each has made a positive and valuable contribution to the college. The candidates approached the process with maturity and provided insightful and thought-provoking ideas for how to lead the pupil body. We shall be announcing the successful senior pupils in the final week of term but would be proud for the college to be

represented by any one of them.

End of year arrangements

As you are aware, term finishes on Friday 18 July. The arrangements for the end of term are as follows.

We are keen to end the year positively and to that end, intend that our final day is an opportunity for staff and pupils to spend time together in an enjoyable and light-hearted way. Registration will take place as normal; Lessons 1 and 2 will be slightly shorter normal lessons; after break, Years 9 and 10 will assemble on the school field for a range of sporting competition and activity. Years 7 and 8 will be entertained by their peers to a concert in the Henry Morris Hall. All year groups will be dismissed at midday. The majority of school buses are scheduled to arrive on the college site at 12.05pm. The buses will follow the normal routes and all pupils should arrive home in the usual time-frame.

Unfortunately, Stagecoach is not prepared to run the 31B and 31C at this adjusted time. Pupils who would normally travel by this service (some 29 in total) will be accompanied to the bus stop and supervised until they depart on the C7. Please remember that this is a public service bus and you will be expected to have change or a return ticket. Parents may wish to make alternative arrangements for them, of course.

The 596 bus will not be able to come to collect those pupils

who usually travel on this route. However, we have managed to provide places for the pupils who travel on the 596 to Duxford and get off opposite The Plough. They are to travel by the 592 bus with Kenzies.

Kenzies and Whippet will collect pupils from the playground as usual.

For those pupils who travel to Linton or Babraham we will make the school minibus available and deliver pupils home unless parents make private arrangements.

To clarify arrangements there will be a meeting at school for all pupils who travel on Stagecoach buses.

Please accept my apologies that it is not possible to offer the usual school bus service to all pupils.

Start of term arrangements

Term starts for Year 7 pupils on 2 September, when they will be the only year group in the College. This is intended to give them the chance to settle in without the worry of having to adjust to being in a bigger school with bigger pupils, something which Year 7s tend to find very daunting.

We are very grateful to those of our Year 10 pupils who will join them on the morning to act as their guides and mentors. School buses will follow the published timetable at the start and end of the school day. In order to assist the new Year 7 pupils on their

first morning journey we are aiming for at least one senior pupil who will travel on each bus. New pupils will be sent the appropriate information and bus passes directly from the Transport Department at Shire Hall.

All other year groups start school on Wednesday 3 September. They will spend their first lesson with their form tutors or in assembly; beyond that, they will have a full, normal school day.

Some routines

Uniform

Year on year, there is significant improvement in the smartness of our pupils' uniform. The vast majority of them take very seriously their responsibility to represent their school positively in and out of school; wearing their uniform smartly is a major part of the impression they create on visitors and on members of the local community.

We will continue to insist on a high standard of uniform from all of our pupils. We need your continuing support. I am attaching a copy of the revised uniform code to this letter. I should be grateful if you would ensure that your son or daughter complies fully with the code from the start of the new term. When you are purchasing uniform, please only buy those items which are outlined on our official uniform list.

It is important to note that school is not about high fashion; it's about comfortable

serviceable clothing which is uniform and smart in school and on the way to and from school. To that end, please provide your son or daughter with a smart outdoor coat. As the uniform list indicates, track suit, logo-ed, denim and hooded tops are not appropriate school wear.

We were somewhat dismayed to realise that some of the major chain stores are now stocking black trainers in their 'school shoes' sections. When you buy for the new term, please only buy traditional school shoes, no matter the exhortations from your young people.

You can purchase school uniform from the school shop from 10.00 am to 3.00 pm on the following days:

Please note the change of days in July.

Planner

Each year, we ask our pupils to purchase a planner for the noting of their homework and as a means of communication between home and school. It would be extremely helpful if all pupils could bring the £2.50 on the first day of term to be collected in their forms. Year 7s should also bring £5 for a locker. This payment covers 5 years.

Free school meals

May I take this opportunity to remind you that the Cambridgeshire Local Education Authority can help you with certain school expenses; a leaflet can be obtained from reception giving details of the available help. The College offers free school meals to those eligible, which can be taken at either the canteen or the snack shop. If you wish to take advantage of this service, then please pick up an application form from the school office. All received applications will be processed for Tuesday 2 September for Year 7s and helpers and Wednesday 3 September 2008 for Years 8-11. If you require any further assistance please telephone Mrs Perry in reception and she will be able to help.

Uniform list 2008 / 09

To ensure their smart appearance in and around the College and on their way to and from school, it is important that all of our pupils conform to the College dress code.

Girls

Skirt	Black; plain fabric, not denim, denim-look or fashion fabric; conventional school uniform style, not flounced, approximately knee-length.
Trousers	Black; plain traditional school uniform fabric, not denim or denim-look; conventional school uniform style, not fashion trousers. For example, combat trousers, flared trousers, or trousers with studs, fashion belts or beads on them are not acceptable. Trousers should sit on the waist, not the hips. No underwear should be on show at any time.
Polo shirt	White with school crest
Sweatshirt	Burgundy with school crest
Socks	Black
Tights	Black or natural; unpatterned
Shoes	Conventional black leather-type shoes, with back with no logos, stripes or coloured laces; no platform soles; all shoes must be either flat or with a low heel for reasons of safety. No boots or trainers may be worn.

Boys

Trousers	Black; plain traditional school uniform fabric, not denim or denim-look; conventional school uniform style, not fashion trousers; trousers should sit on the waist, not the hips; no underwear should be on show at any time.
Polo shirt	White with school crest
Sweatshirt	Burgundy with school crest
Socks	Black
Shoes	Conventional, black leather-type shoes with no logos, stripes or coloured laces. No boots or trainers may be worn.

Sports Kit

Maroon rugby shirt
Maroon polo shirt with school logo
Black games shorts
Long maroon socks
White ankle socks
Swimming trunks (boys) and towel
One piece swimming costume (girls) and towel
Trainers or plimsolls
Football boots or hockey boots
Shin pads and gum shield (**very strongly recommended for boys and girls**) for hockey and rugby.
Hair tie to tie back long hair for safety reasons

Optional Extra

Black jogging bottoms (if weather is cold outside)

General

- ❑ Trainers may be worn in the school buildings **only** for PE and Drama lessons. They may **not** be worn in the buildings at any other time. If pupils choose to wear them **to play games** in the lunch hour, they **must** change into shoes before entering the buildings. Provision of a boot bag, or similar, for trainers would be sensible.
- ❑ It is expected that all pupils will wear the polo shirt and sweatshirt together. The collar of the polo shirt must be worn over the sweatshirt. Pupils may, of course, remove the sweatshirt if they wish to adjust their temperature. However, it is important to note that no other garment may be substituted for the sweatshirt. It is not, for example, acceptable to wear the polo shirt with an outdoor coat or jacket worn over it.
- ❑ If a pupil is cold and wishes to wear an extra garment **under** the polo shirt it must be white, without a logo and **not visible** above the neckline of the polo shirt.
- ❑ Outdoor coats and jackets must be removed in classrooms.
- ❑ No denim or denim-look clothing may be worn in school. This includes denim jackets worn as outdoor coats.
- ❑ It is not acceptable to wear a fashion sweatshirt or hooded top as an outdoor coat. An outdoor coat should be plain without fashion logos.
- ❑ Scarves and pashminas may only be worn with suitable outdoor clothing not as fashion items.
- ❑ Baseball caps are not allowed in school.
- ❑ No jewellery may be worn except stud earrings, one in each ear. No charity, friendship bracelets or coloured bands may be worn.
- ❑ The wearing of nose-studs, tongue studs or any other face piercing is strictly forbidden.
- ❑ Shaven heads (below grade 2), extreme styles or colours are not acceptable.
- ❑ No make-up, including nail polish, may be worn.
